Home Hazard Checklist

The following tips and information are from the **National Fire Protection Association (NFPA)**. Please take some time to review and correct any

potential hazards in your home. This is also a great opportunity to educate your whole family on fire safety.

This Home Hazard Checklist



gets the whole family involved in reducing the risk of fire!

I have **smoke detectors** on each level, outside of every sleeping area (hallway) and inside each bedroom.



I test the smoke alarms monthly and replace the batteries each year.*



Emergency preparedness

(Some additional planning and accommodations may be needed for homes with **children**, **individuals with special needs**, **older adults** or **pets**.)



I have an **emergency ladder** in each occupied bedroom as a secondary exit in case the primary exit is blocked. Each room occupant has been shown how to use it if needed.



I have an **evacuation plan**, and review it regularly to ensure everyone knows what to do in an emergency.* (Consider sharing with any house guests.)



Heating

Identify (check) the heating sources in your home:

Furnace/Boiler

Chimney

O Wood-Burning/ Pellet Stove

O Space Heater

Other





I only use the **oven for cooking**, not for heating our home.

There is **nothing flammable** within at least three feet of each heating source.

A "kid-free zone," of at least three feet, has been established around all heating sources.



I only use space heaters for supplemental heating, not for cooking, drying clothing, thawing pipes, etc. The space heater is turned off before heading to bed.

Space heaters and other heating equipment are plugged directly into an outlet, not via an extension cord.





Cooking

I stay in the kitchen the entire time the stove top is in use. I also set a timer when using the oven to remember that it's in use.



A "kid-free zone," of at least three feet, has been established around the stove.

There is **nothing flammable** near the stove.







There is a **charged fire extinguisher** in, or easily accessible from, the kitchen. (Check regularly.*)

Smoking materials



Cigarettes are discarded in a sturdy ashtray and covered in water or sand. (Vegetation can ignite easily and should be avoided at all costs.) E-cigarettes are never charged unattended, since failing batteries have caused small explosions.
