During the meeting, John Esler, former president of the McKown-ville Improvement Association, asked the Guilderland Town Board to provide "firm figures" on the water service the Westmere water District provides to the residents of the McKownville Water District.

Esier also told the board at the meeting that the improvement association is "upset by the lack of information and the conflicting information" that preceded last Tuesday's vote on the proposed consolidation of the two water districts.

The proposed merger was defeated because McKownville residents voted 208 to 233 against it. Westmere district residents voted for the merger 195 to 46, but it had to pass in each water district.

Esler asked the board for "firm figures on the cost of producing the water of the Westmere Water District, the gallonage and sources of water produced by the Westmere Water District, the amount distributed to each district (Westmere and McKownville) and the capital cost of all facilities used to produce and convey water to the McKownville Water District."
