You may know this story, but while Abe Lincoln was running for political office in Illinois he was tagged with being dishonest. That's right, OI Honest Abe. It seems that when he was the post office operator in Salem, Illinois, there was a claim by a disgruntled citizen that when Abe collected the postage for delivered letters (in those days the post office collected the postage costs from the receiver of the letters and not from the sender, as is now done) he did not include the money in the post office account books. Abe was bothered terrifically by this and went to great lengths to refute this false claim. Interestingly enough, this story is told over and over again in biographies about Abe--that is, Abe has never been able to shake the claim that he was dishonest even though the story was false. How much worse it would have been if the post office account books were anything other than dead accurate..
