Dewey Kills M'Kownville Sewer Bill

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Governor Dewey today vetoed a bill authorizing the Town of Guilderland to accept sewers and sewer lines and to operate them for the benefit of taxpayers in the McKownville sewer district. The bill had been introduced by Senator Wicks, Kingston Republican.

In a memorandum the Governor noted "the supervisor of the Town of Guilderland has advised me that the Town Board is unaniously opposed to the bill."

Edwin L. Fowler, town attorney, said members of the Town Board felt the town "could not give good service" to the McKownville residents, because the sewer system "is in a bad state of repair."

He said the McKownville residents "are in a bad way" for sewer facilities, inasmuch as most of them are using septic tanks and outmoded storm sewers. No move is in progress at present, he added, to improve sewers in the area.

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
