

Due on Acquiring Sewer

McKownville's sewer district will be able to take over the area's present patch-work sewer system and keep it in repair at the expense of benefitting taxpayers under legislation passed by the Assembly yesterday and sent to the Governor.

The measure is co-sponsored by Senator Chauncey Hammond, Elmira, and Assemblyman Leo Noonan, Farmersville. It gives authority to the Guilderland Town Board actually to acquire the properties on the sewer district's behalf and also to raise such taxes as may be needed.

The sewer district was formed in August 1947, but abandoned a plan to put in a sewer when bids went 125 per cent beyond the \$194,000 limit set by the comptroller.

The district itself, however, continues, in part to handle an \$11,000 indebtedness incurred in making plans, advertising for bids, and paying legal counsel.

A bill similar to the Hammond-Noonan one was vetoed by the Governor last year but McKownville residents believe the pres-

ent one clears up all of the 1949 objections.

They point out their community has been adjudged by the New York Telephone Company as the most likely in the Albany area to expand rapidly. Since 1947, they report, assessed valuation has zoomed 19 per cent.

It is indicated that building of an entirely new sewer system will be delayed until the water system is more nearly paid for and until the number of taxpayers in the area increases.
