

STATE UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK AT ALBANY

The growth of the former State University College at Albany, in student body and breadth of curriculum, has necessitated relocation and expansion on a new campus at the Western outskirts of the city.

Here, as a regional graduate center, the newly designated State University of New York at Albany can attain its full potential, providing higher education opportunities for students from throughout the state as well as the Capital Region.

Education of teachers will continue to be an important function, but only one of several major responsibilities.

Introduction of a full liberal arts curriculum is underway and graduate studies, which now extend to the doctoral level in Education, will be further expanded.

Full-time enrollment at present is nearly 2,800. Initial construction at the new campus, to be ready

in 1965, will accommodate 4,500, and additional construction by 1966 will provide for a capacity of 7,000. It is expected there will be facilities for about 10,000 students by 1970.

The long-range program will involve continued use of existing dormitory and other housing facilities located in the general area of the present campus. The Milne School, a junior-senior high, also will continue to be operated by the college for its teacher education program.

THE NEW CAMPUS

The new Albany campus is unique in its unification of all buildings in a great formal architectural composition.

The construction program through 1966, when the Campus will have a capacity of 7,000 students, will cost \$57.7 million. It is anticipated that further expansion will bring total expenditures to more than \$70 million.
